Principal's Message



Dave Dobbyn once wrote a song about the weather and that was my theme for 2023. It was a year of extraordinary weather patterns, and life seemed to parallel the many seasons that we are so used to in New Zealand.

Cyclones

The cyclones that ravaged New Zealand in the early months of 2023 impacted us all. As we all know, living in a small country means that everything is connected to us or our neighbour. During these difficult times, there was connection and compassion that had all of us reaching out to serve our community.

I also sent a call out to the school community to send items from their pantries so we could donate to the effort. The wonderful response to this call served as reminder of what our special Anglican character is all about: that in doing for others we grow ourselves.

Weathering a changing world

Key messages came into play with important topics creating differing 'weather patterns' in schools: equity, diversity, inclusivity, safety, and education in the age of smart machines. No matter the position of any school, the reality

I was successful in being awarded a sabbatical from the Ministry for the first five weeks of term four.

My sabbatical was on 'Executive and Corporate Leadership Structuring for Educational Futures' (yes, I too had to take a wee rest part way through writing that lofty title!). I met some significant souls in the corporate and educational spheres, all

with the objective of growing myself and the strategic direction of the school of which I am a part.

From Film Dreams to Furry Friends: How a Job at the Zoo changed Emma's Career Plans

Emma Bassett was a graduate of the class of 2020 when she signed up for Film Studies at Victoria University. Things changed, however, when she took on a part time job in the gift shop at Wellington Zoo.

"Quite quickly after starting work, I realised that Film really wasn't for me and that I actually wanted to work with animals," she says.

"At first I thought that would be as a vet nurse but after spending a day out in the Zoo with some of the Zookeepers I decided that this was the path for me."

From there, Emma had to secure a relevant qualification to ensure entry into a competitive industry. She studied for a Certificate in Animal Management (Zookeeping) through distance learning at Unitec. The study takes 12 months and includes a placement at an authorised facility – luckily she was able to do the placement at Wellington Zoo.

"I began in a part-time role as Primate Keeper, and am now full time. I can tell you that no two days are the same – animals are guite unpredictable!"

A typical routine involves an early morning visit to the animals, feeding them and cleaning their habitats. This is followed by training and enrichment. Training is when animals are taught certain behaviours to assist with their care, management and wellbeing, while enrichment aims to enhance the animals' physical and mental wellbeing by providing opportunities that stimulate natural behaviours, encourage problemsolving and prevent boredom.



Throughout the rest of the day, the animals participate in visitor experiences – such as close encounters (a group of people getting up close to the animals), and "talk times" where the keeper gives an educational overview of the animals.

After that, it's dinner time for the animals and goodnight from the keepers.

Emma says she's had many highlights during the last 18 months, including building relationships with the animals and earning their trust. A special highlight for her was meeting a world famous expert on Chimpanzees.

"My absolute dream come true was meeting Jane Goodall, who is famous for her ground-breaking work with chimpanzees in Tanzania. Jane came to Wellington Zoo in June as part of her "Reasons for Hope" tour. I had the opportunity to speak to her a little bit about some of the chimpanzees at Wellington Zoo, and ask her about her career and research."


As for advice for those keen to pursue a career in zookeeping, Emma says volunteering is a great start.


"Volunteering at a zoo, animal shelter or a conservation organisation will help to get your foot in the door. Also the certificate I completed is the preferred qualification for most organisations.

Emma says her career is now everything she had hoped for and more.

"It's a lot more physically intensive than I realised, but still I knew on my first day of placement as a student keeper that I had made the right decision in changing career paths."


students at all levels. We thank you, and all our volunteers for your support.

"I was the first out of my orientation group to arrive, then a flight arrived from Melbourne and one from Sydney and suddenly I was surrounded by about 40 Aussies!"

At Caythorpe, Olivia and her group spent six months looking after school children between the ages of 5 and 18 and supervising their activities, such as the "giant swing" and rock climbing.

"If I wasn't running activities, I would have a group of kids to look after.





Once I had a group of about 30 Italian, French and Chinese children who were all there to try and improve their English. Over those few weeks I learnt just as much about the kids' cultures as they learnt about English from me," Olivia says.

"After camp had finished, I headed off to Sweden where I had found a volunteering job on a dairy farm. I found the job through an app called Worldpackers, who provide a safe environment for volunteer travel."

"It was my first time solo travelling and a great experience – I would strongly encourage people to do something like that if you go overseas," Olivia says.


The hardest part of her gap year was the thought of leaving her friends and family at home.

"It was very rainy during my first week in England which made me a bit homesick. After that it was fine because I was surrounded by a group of people that I ended up forming close friendships with," she says. Grants

SMOGA offers the following Grants to current students

Spirit of New Zealand Grant

The Spirit of New Zealand Grant funds a voyage on the Spirit of New Zealand to a current student. The Grant is open to either:

- A student who is 16 years and over that is a daughter, niece or granddaughter of an SMOGA member, or
- A student at St Matthew's Collegiate from Year 12 or 13 who joins SMOGA

The selection process will be based on a random ballot. The Grant value is currently \$2,500 per year.

Outward Bound Grant

The Outward Bound Grant is new this year and has the same terms and conditions as the Spirit of Adventure Grant.

Endeavour Grant

The Endeavour grant aims to financially assist an Old Girl or the widower of an Old Girl, who wouldn't otherwise be able to afford to send their daughter to St Matthew's. This grant will be available in 2025. Applications are open at the end of 2024.

She has built a top tier business there and is the first female to be in the top five in its 40-year history.

Gretchen advocates and pushes for change to encourage other women to follow in her footsteps and gain the ability to access to the successful and fulfilling career that she has carved out for herself. Gretchen believes that education is the key determinant to improving outcomes, and is committed to doing all she can to close the wealth gap for women by investing and improving education, while coupling this with access to female investment advisers.

Looking at all the male CVs that she received this year for a prominent role in her team, Gretchen wondered what she

could do to encourage more diversity into the financial environment. She has therefore very generously offered, not only an annual scholarship for a Year 13 student looking to study commerce, but also her mentorship for the recipient throughout the scholarship term. Gretchen hopes that this support will enable a young woman the confidence to succeed and use their success to lift up others.

The scholarship will be awarded to an exceptional Year 13 student that is going to study Commerce. The scholarship would be for a total of \$5,000; paid as \$2,500 at the beginning of Year 1, and the remainder at the beginning of Year 2.

Applications will be open to current Year 13 students between 1 September and 25 October 2024. The scholarship winner will be announced at our annual St Matthew's Prizegiving in December.
